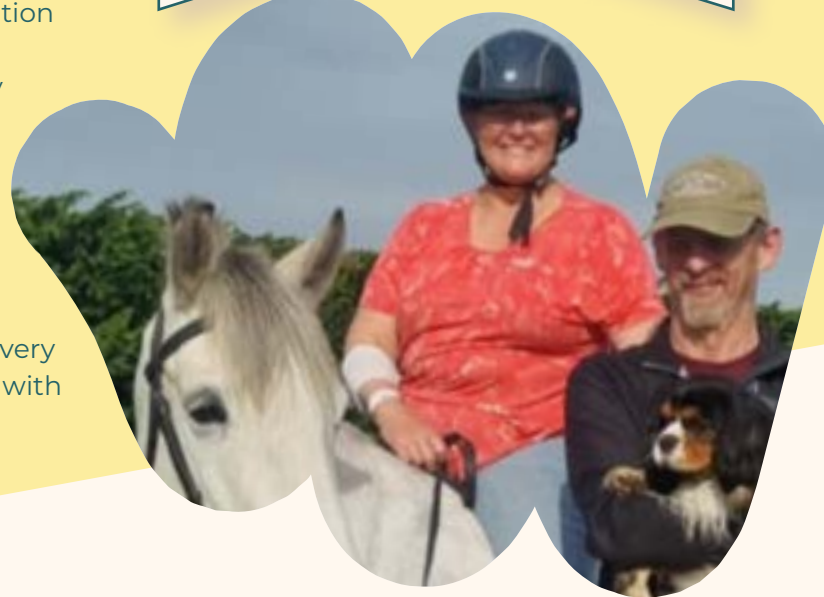

A message from

Alana and Jane

With the support of donors and our community, we are proud of the significant and meaningful progress we have made over the past twelve months to improve the lives of women affected by ovarian cancer.

Our personal highlights include:

The 2025 financial year saw us increase support available to women through their ovarian cancer diagnosis, offering connection, resources, and access to professional support. This included launching our funded one-on-one counselling programme and funded physiotherapy and rehabilitation through the PINC & STEEL programme. It is humbling to hear the impact this is making on women's lives.

A step forward in how we support research. This year, we launched our first travel grant, placing Sonesavanah Larkham, a New Zealand PhD student at the University of Edinburgh, to learn from world-leading experts. We were thrilled to see her go on to be awarded the Cancer Society's 2024 National Research Grant to continue her work into the early detection of ovarian cancer. We also entered into a new partnership with the Cancer Research Trust, the second-largest non-governmental cancer research funder in New Zealand. We have plans next year to fund our largest competitive grant to date and invest in genomic sequencing research.

February saw us launch Show Up as our flagship campaign during Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month. Together, we raised over \$90,000, an incredible result in the first

year. Alongside our nationwide billboard campaign, we launched a six-week Mediboard campaign in over 80 medical practices across Aotearoa to raise awareness of the symptoms of ovarian cancer.

We also welcomed a hard-fought win: the long-awaited funding of niraparib and bevacizumab, two targeted treatments for advanced ovarian cancer. New Zealand is years behind other countries in making these drugs accessible to women with ovarian cancer, and the delay in access shows how much more work there is to do.

Our charity began as Cure Our Ovarian Cancer. In early 2024, we rebranded our local efforts as the Ovarian Cancer Foundation New Zealand. In September 2024, we built on that by rebranding our global low-grade serous work as the Low-Grade Serous Ovarian Cancer Initiative, a project especially close to Jane's heart. It gives women with this rare cancer and their loved ones a way to support vital research on their cancer, connect with others and access information about their diagnosis that's often hard to find. Through the LGSOC Initiative, we raised awareness of ovarian cancer for the fourth year in a row with billboards in London and New York on World Ovarian Cancer Day.

We were also delighted to welcome our new trustee, Maddy Chamberlain, who brings a strong background in public service and community work. And we farewelled our first General Manager, Whitney Gernhoefer, who helped grow our fundraising and expand our support programme. We're so grateful for her mahi, and we're excited to have Liz Pennington on board, bringing fresh energy and vision.

Last year, more than 200 women in Aotearoa died from ovarian cancer. We carry their memories and stories with us every day. They, and their whānau, are why we do this work.

There's still a long way to go, but we're ready for the challenge. Your continued support makes everything we do possible. Follow along with our mahi, share your story, and help us keep making a difference.

Challenges women face

There are challenges every step of the way when facing ovarian cancer, from having to push for a diagnosis, to a lack of treatments, to the impact that it has financially, physically, mentally, and on your whānau. Women facing ovarian cancer today share some of their challenges:

I wish we didn't have to fight for access to better drugs without going into debt having to sell homes, downgrade. I have gone into debt trying to keep health insurance knowing I am out of funded options. Just cancelled it to afford power and food. It's soul destroying.

I had never heard of ovarian cancer before I was diagnosed with it!

Erin B

I visited my doctor multiple times and was told my symptoms were due to IBS or a UTI. I eventually got diagnosed via the emergency room after being dismissed by my doctor for years.

Leondra R

I had clear cell ovarian cancer. Currently, I am doing well, but the thought that it could return is a real worry.

Research into new ways of treating ovarian cancer is imperative. I remember one of the clinicians saying to me in the hospital, after my operation to remove a large tumour, that they try and keep us alive until a breakthrough in treatment happens.

It seemed crazy that the only option for me was chemotherapy when there are so many other new treatments for other types of cancers.

I would like to see opportunities for clinical trials and further research funding become mainstream for ovarian cancer so that others diagnosed feel a sense of hope for their future.

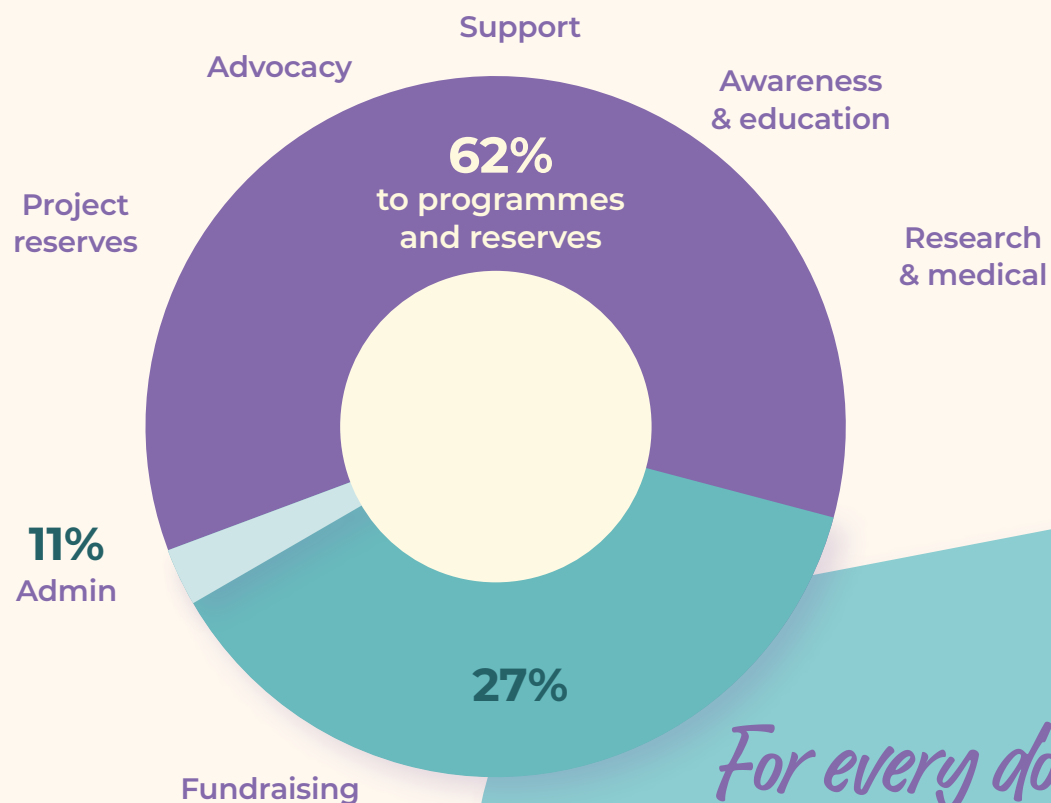

Research

Q&A with Dr Alicia Didsbury,
Cancer researcher at the University
of Auckland, and OCFNZ Trustee



Why is research so important to OCFNZ?

Research is the key to changing outcomes for women diagnosed with ovarian cancer. Since the 1980s, survival rates for ovarian cancer have barely improved, unlike other cancers such as breast and prostate cancer, where sustained research investment has led to major advances in early detection and treatment. This disparity always highlights the urgent need for targeted ovarian cancer research. At OCFNZ, we are committed to improving the lives of those affected by ovarian cancer, and supporting high-quality, innovative research is one of the most powerful tools we have to drive change and save lives.

In 2024–25, OCFNZ advertised grants worth \$80,000, but only \$40,000 was awarded. Why was there a shortfall?

There is a lack of stable and sustained funding for ovarian cancer research in New Zealand, which has made it difficult to build and maintain strong research pipelines. The number of scientists with the capacity to focus on ovarian cancer is very small, and developing new ways to study the disease or create innovative technologies takes time and long-term commitment. In the current environment, scientists often need to make tough choices about how to spend their time and resources, prioritising projects that are more likely to receive ongoing funding. Unfortunately, that meant that last year, very few researchers were in a position to apply for OCFNZ grants - not due to lack of interest or importance, but due to broader challenges within the New Zealand research environment.

Why is it so challenging to fund health research in New Zealand?

New Zealand punches above its weight when it comes to research talent and innovation, but we consistently lag behind in research investment. Government funding for health research is limited and highly competitive, so only a small proportion of projects receive support. For uncommon and under-recognised cancers like ovarian cancer (which lacks the visibility and funding momentum of more common cancers), the challenge is even greater. This means that critical projects aimed at improving early detection, understanding disease biology, or testing new treatments often go unfunded or are significantly delayed. Without dedicated support, we lose talented researchers to better-resourced fields or overseas institutions, which in turn means we lose momentum and opportunity.

What are OCFNZ's plans to support more research in 2025–26?

We recognise how difficult it is for scientists in New Zealand to develop sustainable research programmes in this space, particularly in the face of limited funding and competing pressures. In 2025-26, we've partnered with the Cancer Research Trust NZ to offer a targeted ovarian cancer research grant. This collaboration allows us to reach a wider network of researchers and fund projects through a well-established, expert-led review process.

I'm really excited to share that this year we've increased our funding commitment. Alongside funding a travel grant, supporting clinical trials and other initiatives we have increased our main ovarian cancer research grant to \$80,000, which is enough to support salary and provide critical seed funding for the development of new, innovative ideas. The CRT grant will fund one year of research and is designed to help scientists generate the preliminary data needed to secure larger, long-term funding from national and international sources. By working with CRT, we are taking a big step towards strengthening ovarian cancer research in New Zealand.

Charity of choice for Mrs New Zealand

We were thrilled to be supported by the Mrs New Zealand pageant this year. In the lead up to the event contestants raised over \$10,000.

Woodlands Rugby Club

Woodlands Rugby Club realised their clubhouse was in dire need of a new roof and were planning a fundraiser to cover the large cost. But at the same time, the premier coach's wife was diagnosed with ovarian cancer.

This incredible community decided to redirect their fundraising efforts raising over \$31,000 and donating it to OCFNZ!



Funding advances in rare ovarian cancers

In October we were thrilled to award a \$40,000 grant to Dr Aaron Stevens and his team at the University of Otago, Wellington.

The grant was awarded for the pilot study, 'Identifying genetic and epigenetic drivers of low-grade serous carcinoma.' This research aims to deepen understanding of LGSOC, a rare type of ovarian cancer that disproportionately affects younger women, which OCFNZ has a special focus on.

The research team will utilise recently released nanopore DNA sequencing technology to analyse genetic and DNA methylation differences associated with LGSOC. By identifying key biomarkers and potential drug targets, the study seeks to pave the way for more effective, personalised treatments for LGSOC. The ultimate goal is to improve patient treatment options and improve survival rates for those affected by this difficult-to-treat type of ovarian cancer.



Supporting future leaders in research

This year, we awarded our first International Travel Grant to PhD candidate Sonesavanh Larnkham, who is based in the Pitman Lab Group at Te Herenga Waka: Victoria University of Wellington. The grant enabled her to visit a world-renowned ovarian cancer research facility at the University of Edinburgh in Scotland, where she learned from respected researchers Dr Charlie Gourley and Dr Robb Hollis and brought her new skills and knowledge back to New Zealand.

Sonesavanh is part of a newly established research programme focused on improving early ovarian cancer diagnosis. Her PhD project involves validating micro-RNAs, small genetic molecules that may be released into the bloodstream by ovarian cancer cells early in disease development, as biomarker candidates for detecting early epithelial ovarian cancer. She is currently working with blood samples donated to the Wellington Gynaecological BioBank to investigate whether these micro-RNAs can be detected in patients.

During her time in Edinburgh, Sonesavanh gained hands-on experience with genomic sequencing data analysis and observed tissue culturing techniques that may help improve her group's research methods. She returned with valuable insights and skills to share with her team.

Advocacy

Education and awareness

Improving symptom awareness and education remains important to us, and this year we continued to push for ovarian cancer education to be included in the National Cervical Screening Programme.

We have faced challenges, but we are encouraged that the dialogue continues, and we still see this as a valuable way to ensure more women are educated and empowered.

Ultrasound access

As part of last year's submission to parliament, we recommended the government approve access to ultrasounds to help improve ovarian cancer testing.

In May, increased funding for radiology was announced. This funding boost means that GPs will be able to refer women for private ultrasounds if the public system cannot accommodate them within the recommended time frame.

Pharmac funding

We joined with other cancer charities in CANGO and Patient Voice Aotearoa to advocate for increased funding for Pharmac to ensure funding for treatments. The government has committed to increasing Pharmac's funding by \$604 million over the next four years, which paved the way for bevacizumab to be funded.



Medicines access

It was fantastic to be part of the Valuing Life – Medicines Access Summit at Parliament, organised by Patient Voice Aotearoa and Medicines New Zealand. This was an important opportunity to talk with decision-makers about the issues New Zealanders face in accessing medicines.

Our hope is that in the future, no one in the ovarian cancer community will have to self-fund, fundraise or move to another country to access unfunded drugs. We are committed to continuing to advocate for this and are proud to stand by other organisations doing the same for their communities.

Reformer Pilates Bethlehem

This female-driven community raised over \$2,500 in a day, highlighting the importance of community and standing up for women's health.

Awareness and education

Raising awareness of ovarian cancer and improving education remains essential to improving outcomes in New Zealand.

Mediboard

During Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month, we ran our first-ever Mediboard campaign, raising awareness of the symptoms of ovarian cancer. Mediboards can be found in primary care practices across the country. These high-profile digital posters are able to be viewed by those in reception areas. The symptoms video was shown in over 80 medical centres and was played over 570,000 times. This high-profile campaign was made possible thanks to a generous grant.



World Ovarian Cancer Day

World Ovarian Cancer Day 2024 saw us highlight the message that Ovarian Cancer Can Affect Anyone. This allowed us to highlight two important messages

First, that women of any age and health status can be affected, unfortunately, we have heard too often that women have had testing delayed because they weren't deemed old or sick enough to have cancer.

Secondly, we wanted to acknowledge the communities that are affected by ovarian cancer, while the woman is at the centre of that, her diagnosis can have a huge effect on friends, colleagues, and most importantly their whānau. We are grateful to Harrison, whose Mum, Sara, has ovarian cancer, for fronting this campaign.

Support for women with ovarian cancer

This year, we continued to offer two monthly peer support groups and have considerably expanded our support offering by launching two new services and more informative resources.

Funded counselling Launched in November

12 women received free professional counselling

We give women access to three fully-funded one-on-one counselling sessions with counsellors, allowing them to address individual circumstances, no matter what stage of their diagnosis they are at.

Funded physio and rehab Launched in April

30 women accessed free physio and rehabilitation sessions

We facilitate tailored physiotherapy and rehabilitation, which can make a huge difference to how women recover from surgery, adapt to changes in their body and handle the rigours of cancer treatment. We are proud to partner with PINC & STEEL to increase access to these services for women with ovarian cancer.

Webinars Launched in April

7 webinars across the year

with a combined attendance of 77 people and over 280 viewed the webinars after the live sessions.

Webinars allow us to connect women with experts on a variety of topics. Topics included nutrition, recurrence, exercise and physiotherapy, clinical trials, research and more. With 300 women diagnosed with ovarian cancer each year, these webinars are reaching a significant share of newly diagnosed women, ensuring they can access reliable, timely information.

Carol Nelson

In January 2025, Carol Nelson passed away after 20 years of facing ovarian cancer. Carol was an absolute trailblazer and cornerstone of the ovarian cancer community in Aotearoa. Among her many achievements in driving change for ovarian cancer, she was the founder of Ovarian Cancer Awareness Month in New Zealand, an incredibly important event that we are proud to be part of each year, and will continue to passionately support in her memory.

Carol held information sessions about ovarian cancer, spoke at events across New Zealand, attended conferences internationally, and sold teal coloured merchandise, to share information and educate others about ovarian cancer.

Sadly, after multiple recurrences over twenty years, Carol passed away peacefully at home with her family and best friend by her side. Carol's family and friends miss her dearly. They are extremely proud of how she faced cancer and take comfort in knowing that Carol is now at peace and free of pain.



Low-Grade Serous Ovarian Cancer Initiative

Low-grade serous ovarian cancer (LGSOC) is a rare and severely under-researched type of ovarian cancer that disproportionately affects younger women. We've been prioritising research and driving progress for LGSOC since our beginning in 2018, at a time when few ovarian cancer charities around the world had ever funded any LGSOC research.

Honouring our commitment to LGSOC, on the 9th of September 2024, on the inaugural LGSOC Awareness Day we launched a dedicated brand for our global LGSOC project called the Low-Grade Serous Ovarian Cancer Initiative.

The mission of the LGSOC Initiative is to radically improve survival of women with LGSOC through research, and to provide good information to enable and empower them to make informed decisions about their care.

Highlights from the past year include:

- ▶ Celebrating our brand launch with a webinar led by world expert Dr David Gershenson, Professor of Gynaecological Oncology at the University of Texas MD Anderson Cancer Center, that was attended by over 100 women.
- ▶ Reaching 1000 members of our Low-Grade Serous Ovarian Cancer Peer Support Group.
- ▶ Over 1000 engaged sessions on our new website in its first month.
- ▶ Adding six new LGSOC resources to our website including our Guide to Hormone Therapy.
- ▶ Attending the first ever LGSOC patient conference hosted by our US research partners STAAR LGSOC Foundation in January during their 5th anniversary.
- ▶ Receiving a STAAR Partnership Award in recognition of our close collaboration since their founding in 2020.
- ▶ Highlighting LGSOC through our impactful World Ovarian Cancer Day campaign on billboards in Piccadilly Circus London and New York Times Square.

Australia (ANZGOG) \$23,000 AUD

ANZGOG's current research programme includes the PARAGON II clinical trial investigating the use of CDK4/6 inhibitors with letrozole in rare gynaecological cancers, including LGSOC; and a laboratory study investigating the combined use of MEK inhibitors and CDK4/6 inhibitors in LGSOC.

Funds raised this year will be used to support a future ANZGOG research project focussed on improving outcomes for those living with this rare and often treatment-resistant cancer.

Canada (BC Cancer Foundation) \$8,782.50 CAD

Funds raised in Canada support LGSOC researcher Dr Mark Carey's laboratory contributing to the following advancements for LGSOC.

- ▶ Comprehensive assessment of Folate Receptor Alpha as a therapeutic target in LGSOC (PMID 40150910).
- ▶ Working with the Canadian Cancer Trials Group and NRG to develop a clinical trial using the novel drug combination avutometinib/defactinib as primary treatment after surgery for patients diagnosed with LGSOC.
- ▶ Development of patient-derived xenograft (PDX) of 5 unique LGSOC cases. These are still under assessment.
- ▶ Development of patient-derived 2D cell lines from primary LGSOC patient.
- ▶ Successful development of PDX-derived 2D cell lines
- ▶ Clinical data collection for LGSOC registry for the Terry Fox's Marathon of Hope.
- ▶ Expansion of collaboration network, sharing of cell lines with researchers from Memorial Sloan Kettering Cancer Center, European Institutes of Oncology and University of Otago (on behalf of the International Consortium for low-grade serous ovarian cancer).



New Zealand (Ovarian Cancer Foundation New Zealand)

In New Zealand we directly funded two research projects related to LGSOC

A \$40,000 grant to Dr. Stevens from the University of Otago, Wellington, for his pilot study, 'Identifying genetic and epigenetic drivers of low-grade serous carcinoma.' A travel grant funding a laboratory placement for an early career researcher from New Zealand to gain experience with our LGSOC research partners in the United Kingdom. (read more on page 13)

United Kingdom (University of Edinburgh)

£34,075.23

Supporting Professor Gourley's LGSOC research laboratory at the university of Edinburgh. They have used the kind donations to fund part of the salary of a post-doctoral researcher (Dr Sarah Taylor) who is progressing low grade serous ovarian cancer research on two main fronts. Sarah has optimised a protocol for routinely growing tumours derived from patient samples in the laboratory so that their responsiveness to various therapies can be tested outside of the patient. They now have a number of these 'organoids' growing in the laboratory. Sarah has also performed a drug screen to find cancer drugs which combine best with the drug trametinib, in the hope that they can test these combinations in clinical trials. A number of hits have been identified and these are currently being validated in the laboratory before transferring to the clinic.

United States (STAAR Low-Grade Serous Ovarian Cancer Foundation)

\$1,420 USD (direct donations, fundraisers not tracked)

Funds raised for STAAR go directly to research into low-grade serous ovarian cancer (LGSOC). STAAR works with leading scientists, clinicians, and research institutions to help drive progress and improve outcomes for people with this rare cancer.

In April the first research project jointly funded by STAAR Ovarian Cancer and the Low-Grade Serous Ovarian Cancer Initiative (under our previous name Cure Our Ovarian Cancer) was published in Nature:

In **Nature** the project investigated estrogen signalling in low-grade serous ovarian cancer (LGSOC) to better understand how the cancer cells use estrogen.

"We found that our approach can better predict the response of patients to endocrine therapy, including [those with] LGSOC," Wong said. "In addition, we identified a few genes which are associated with endocrine therapy resistance."

In February, STAAR celebrated its 5th anniversary with its first-ever Patient Conference in Houston. 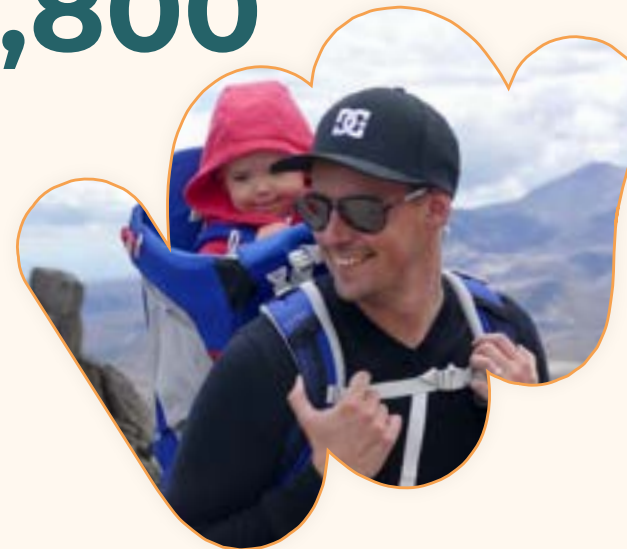

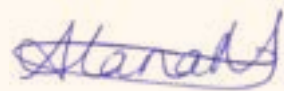

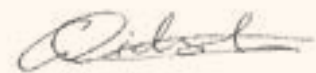
